
## Accessibility:

- Access and arrival is barrier-free
  - Two disabled-accessible car parking spaces available (300m to the entrance)
  - Access by bus possible
  - Access is mostly easy to walk and drive on
  - Maximum gradient 14% over a length of 15m
- Public barrier-free toilet available
  - o Accessible from the right and left
  - Sink can be driven under
  - o Grab handles on both sides
  - Changing table available
- Visit is barrier-free
  - Tour of the zoo is around 1km long
  - o Information boards are in three languages (only in text form)
  - Lots of seating and picnic areas available
  - o Paths in the zoo are made of water-bound surface
    - At least 200cm wide
    - Maximum gradient 14% over a length of 15m
- Café "Bamhauscafé" barrier-free
  - Tables can be driven under
  - Menu with high visual contrast
- Barrier-free overnight accommodation concept in "Escher Bamhaiser"
  - $\circ$   $\;$  The Bamhaus "Maisy" is accessible on the ground floor at ground level  $\;$
  - o Minimum width 83cm
  - Shower chair Handles foldable on both sides
  - o Sink in the kitchen can be moved underneath



The paths in the « Déierepark » are easy to tread, there's no steep inclines

The information boards, while text-only, are presented in three languages and have visual aids





The « Bamhauscafé » (top left) is as accessible as possible. Tables can be driven under, the menu is high in contrast and easily legible. The public restroom (top right) is very spaceous, has handles on both sides and has a sink you can drive under.

The « Maisy » overnight stay is accessible – everything is at ground level and the narrowest part is 83cm wide. The kitchen and sink are able to be driven under (bottom right). The shower and restroom is accessible (bottom left), with the room disposing of a shower seat as well as several handles.
